We have decided to change the day structure for our new Year 12 cohort so that they do not have any split classes. This will follow the pattern followed by Year 12 earlier in the year.

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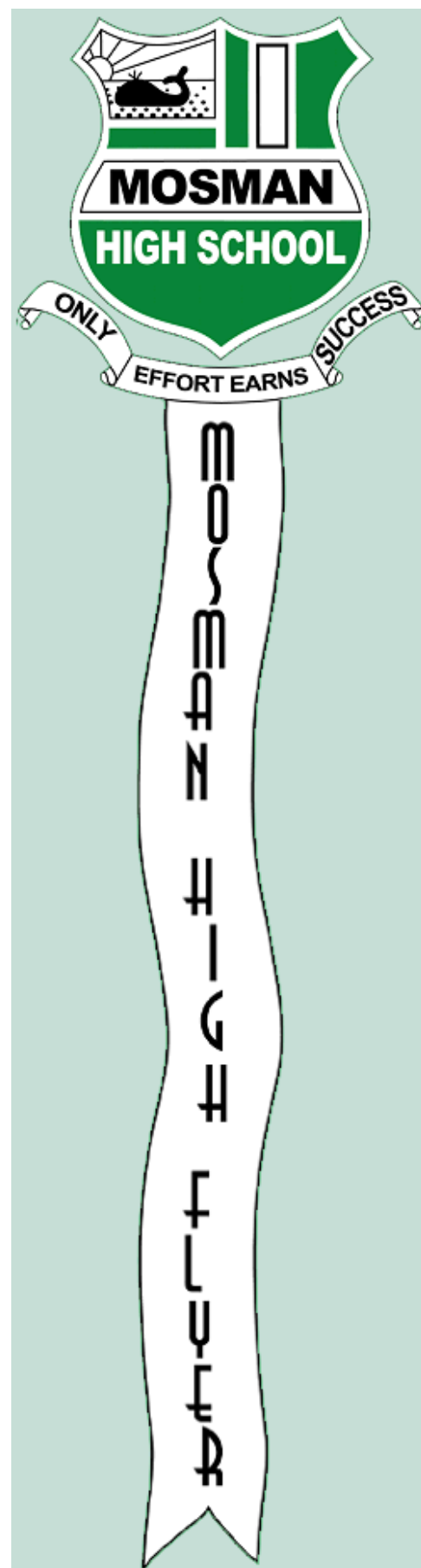

-19, nevertheless there are guidelines in place through the Department:

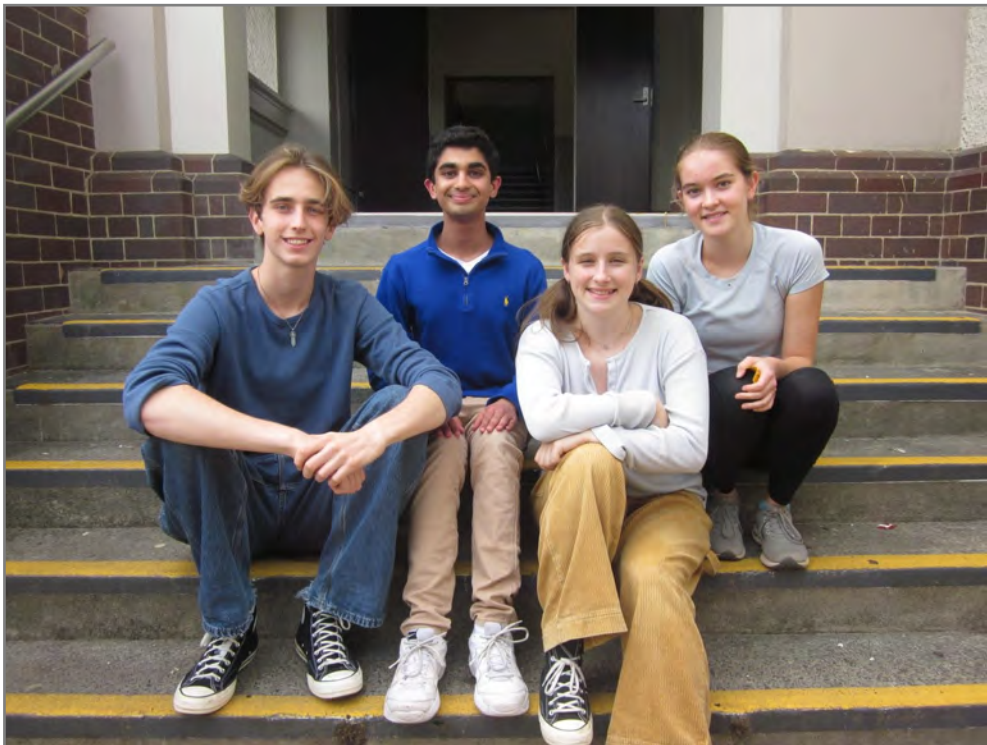
- Students who are sick or displaying COVID symptoms should stay at home

Only Effort Earns Success

Often I find students will say "I want to do the HSC" but do not know why and how to put into place the actions needed to engage in the learning necessary to achieve their personal best. Last week Year 11 received their results from the preliminary exams in Term 3. In a few weeks, Year 11 will have their reports receiving feedback from their teachers commenting about their performances and how to improve. It is important therefore, over the next few weeks, for students to set goals to improve achievement. At MHS we encourage SMART GOALS. Academic personal goals should be specific, challenging and focused on self-improvement.

SMART goals are:

- S Specific
- M Measurable
- A Achievable and Attractive
- R Realistic
- T Time bound

This term Year 12's first assessment will be run in Week 8. This will be a full week of assessment for all subjects with time given to prepare. It is important for students with the help of their teachers, peers and family to set personal and academic goals aiming to do better on previous efforts. In fact Week 8 will follow a StuVac program where students only attend for assessments.

Here are some prompts for discussion with your child to prepare and perform SMART. Ask your student to reflect on the following:

- My PB is obtaining a better result in _____.
- What are you aiming for?
- Is this PB maintaining a previous best or improving on a previous best? YES/NO
- If no, develop a PB that does.
- Do you believe you can reach this PB? YES/NO
- If NO, you need to develop a PB that you can reach.
- When do you plan to reach this PB?
- Describe the steps involved in reaching your PB
 - First I will _____
 - Next I will (parts) _____
 - Next I will seek feedback from my peers and my teachers _____
 - Next I will practise at home _____
 - Next I will assess my progress by _____
 - Next I will ask _____
 - Next I will reflect and check _____
 - In week 6, I will _____
 - I will reward myself when _____

Students over the coming weeks will also be able to nominate a staff mentor. I encourage students to access this opportunity. The focus of the mentoring relationship may be social and emotional support and increasing the mentee's self-confidence and motivation. In the early phases of this relationship a discussion with the mentor about aspirations and goals can be an invaluable experience. The mentor can provide guidance about how the goals can be achieved and what are the next steps.

Parents can also play a significant part. By setting goals and expectations together it allows parents to be on the same page as their student throughout the year. It encourages mutual understanding and a shared vision for your student's academic growth. Whether the student is at home or school, they will always have someone who can help them with their academic questions. The program at this sport and recreation site will offer our students many different experiences from grass skiing, cookouts, damper making, mountain bike and BMX bike riding in fact a vast array of activities are on offer in a unique, beautiful setting.

Please be there by 8 am. We will be returning on Wednesday 2nd November around 4-4.30pm .

The qualified catering team at the camp prepare nutritious and delicious meals so your child will never go hungry at camp. If your child has any special dietary requirements or food allergies, it's crucial that these are listed on the Medical and Consent form. It's also a good idea to mention it to your child's teacher before camp. Special diets are provided for medical conditions, religious beliefs, and lifestyle choices such as vegetarians or vegans.

We ask that you consider the following:

- Do not bring nuts and products containing nuts on-site
- Engage in a discussion with your child about not sharing food while at camp to prevent cross contamination.

Also do not bring:

- Mobile phones We will ensure that if you need to contact your child or they wish to contact you we will provide access to a landline . Poor reception makes mobile phones and Ipads useless to take on camp.
- Aerosol cans (i.e., spray-on deodorant or insect repellent)
- Electronic devices
- Lollies or chewing gum
- Jewellery

National Carers Week

School Travel

Term 4 2022

2023 school travel applications are now open

Applications for student travel in 2023 open from Monday 10 October 2022.

Students who need a School Opal card or travel pass for 2023 can [apply](#) now. A new application will need to be submitted if they are applying for the first time, or if they are requesting an additional travel entitlement as a result of a new shared parental responsibility situation (e.g. joint custody).

Students who change address, school, campus location, have repeated a year or received an expiry notification from Transport for NSW for their school travel entitlement should [renew or update](#) their details before the end of term 4. This will ensure that schools can endorse applications, and entitlements remain valid for the start of the 2023 school year. School Opal card holders will have the changes applied to their existing card.

If a student's distance eligibility has changed based on their grade (i.e. grade two to grade three), the system will automatically update their entitlement if they meet the new criteria. If they do not meet the new [eligibility criteria](#), we will send an expiry notification via email.

Students who have an entitlement approved under a medical condition that is due to expire will receive a notification advising them to re-apply.

[Term Bus Pass](#) holders will receive a notification to re-apply.

Students in the Opal network applying for an Opal card (including a Term Bus Pass) for the first time will receive their Student Opal card at their nominated postal address. Cards will be mailed out from January 2023.

Students living in rural and regional (R&R) areas should receive their travel pass at the start of the new school year from their nominated transport operator. It may come via the school or be sent directly to them at home. Note: some R&R operators do not issue travel passes. Students/parents should confirm with their nominated operator if they do not receive a pass.

Travel from Term 1 2023

We ask that parents plan ahead and make sure their child knows which service/s to use and has a valid ticket to travel; either a School Opal card or Child/Youth Opal card (within Greater Sydney) or a School Travel Pass (outside Greater Sydney), from the start of the school year.

Applications for 2023 School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) travel open at the start of Term 4 2022, so parents/students can [apply](#) or [update](#) details early and be ready for the start of the new school year.

Most students using the Opal network will not need a new Opal card and can continue travelling on their existing card each year.

The start of the year is a busy period for local transport operators, and students travelling without a valid ticket make service planning and operations difficult.

We recognise that for some families last minute changes to school enrolments mean they may not have a School Opal card or Travel Pass for the start of term. In the Opal network, we strongly encourage these families to have their children travel with a Child/Youth Opal card until they receive their valid School Opal card. If outside Greater Sydney, parents should contact their [local bus operator](#) to discuss their travel needs.

Bus operators are flexible and understanding, particularly at the start of the school year, and will ensure students can travel safely to and from school. But to best support our operators we encourage all students to have a valid ticket, as early as possible, from the start of the school year.

Students using School Opal cards are also reminded that they must tap on and tap off in line with the [Student code of conduct](#) and [Opal terms of use](#).

Visual Arts - Bundanon Camp

On the 4th of October, the second week of the holidays, 33 students and two teachers arrived at school in the dark. The rain had subsided and while it was forecast to return during our stay, it did nothing to diminish the excitement for the next three days. These were dedicated art students from Years 10 and 11 who had taken the opportunity to be immersed in artmaking at the Bundanon Art Museum, the home of Australian artist Arthur Boyd.

“Bundanon was a really great opportunity for us to experience new perspectives and environments to expand our art making practice.” - *Bethany Griffiths*

Nestled along the Shoalhaven river, about 20 minutes west of Nowra is the ‘Bundanon Art Museum’ and ‘The Bridge’. Newly opened, the site won the 2022 Sulman medal for public architecture, (the second for the Bundanon site). Late 2019 and early 2020, bushfires that had taken hold through the east coast of Australia threatened the area and in response a new museum, nicknamed ‘the bunker’, was built into the hill. In addition, a very long accommodation and learning space, clad in blackened timber reminiscent of the burnt out bushland, stands proudly over the valley, giving students a place to stay and learn about the landscape that had inspired the Boyd family of artists.

“Art camp was the highlight of my holidays! It's not very often you are able to completely immerse yourself in a naturally diverse environment and let your artmaking processes completely reflect that. Bundanon itself, as well as the meticulously constructed program, was creatively stimulating and allowed students to produce artworks at a rapid rate. Additionally, the encouragement to experiment with different media sprung new confidence into the year 11's who are preparing for the transition into year 12 Visual Arts, and with it the development of their Major Work. Overall, it was an experience I definitely recommend students pursuing in the coming years.” - *Mia Cumming*

The students spent three immersive days making art, exploring materials and learning about the landscape. While the first day was dry, artmaking was outside in the sun, but as the rain set in everyone moved inside and were given a new view from their elevated position on the Bridge. From here you could see the Kangaroos early in the morning and the fog rolled over Arthur's Hill. Despite the weather students' spirits remained high and they continued to produce skilfully observed artworks.

“Camp Bundanon was a fantastic experience for everyone, the landscape and nature that surrounded us was a beautiful piece of inspiration. The chance to have a couple of days dedicated to enjoying art is a great experience in itself but being able to do it all with your friends and with great teachers makes it even better. I would recommend it to everybody doing art.” - *Kasper Hawke*

CLS3 will showcase the Industrial Technology Multimedia projects from Years 10, 11 & 12.

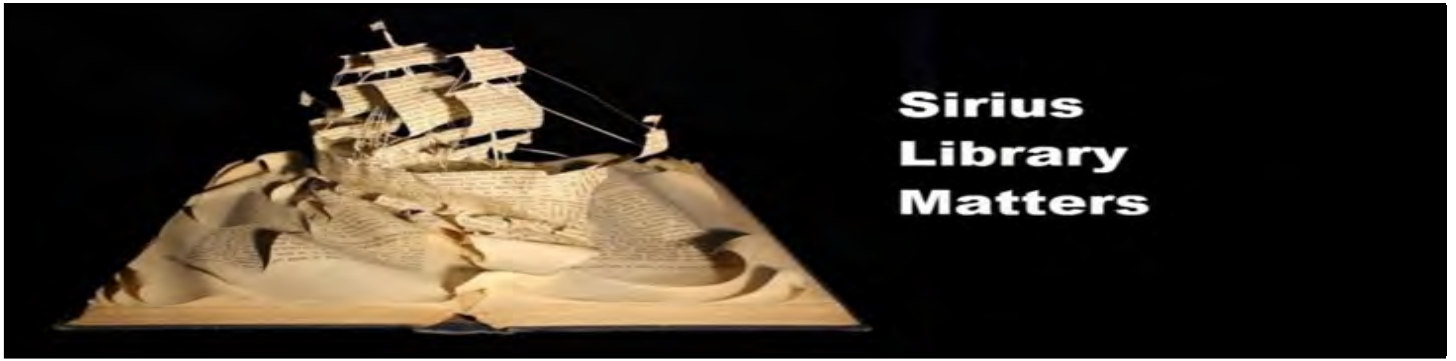

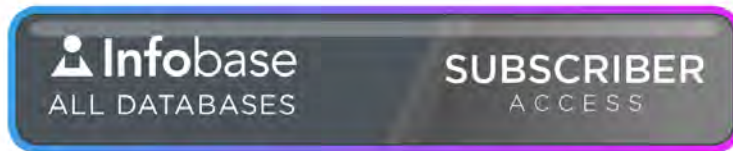
