as G block and provide much needed playground space for our students. Even the new teachers' carpark is well underway and with an overall completion date by the end of November, we are all getting excited.


The HSC has commenced for the 'Class of 2023' with English papers 1 and 2 in the first week, mathematics dominates the start of Week 2. The new hall is providing the perfect space for the HSC examinations. Already we have heard some impressive news. The HSC drama class has had seven nominations for 'On Stage' and the dance class has had six nominations for 'Callback'. This is a fantastic achievement for the students and their teachers John Feros and Desiree De Bono.

Furthermore, we keep hearing of students who have received early entry offers to university, with thirty-seven Year 12 students receiving offers to Macquarie University alone. These offers are issued before the students sit the HSC and provide a measure of confidence knowing that if they desire to go to university they have a place.

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The Year 12 Graduation at the end of Term 3 was such a joyous celebration of student achievement, with Ethan Kijurina being named Dux based on school assessment. Many of the talented Year 12 students also performed their major works in dance, drama and music and all HSC students received their graduation portfolio. An annual highlight of this ceremony is the provision of an 'Art Book' for each Year 12 art student. Compiled by the P&C art committee, these books include photos of every Year 12 student's major art work ... a book to be treasured.

Also, in the last week of Term 3, Year 8 went to camp. With a focus on sustainability and the environment, it was an opportunity to explore a different natural environment and have fun as well. Teachers who accompanied Year 8 said it was a great camp, and that our students were acknowledged as exemplary by the camp organisers. So far, we have held four camps this year, but we still have one to go.

Year 10 will be taking part in the 'Life Ready' camp in Week 8 of this term. The Life Ready program is compulsory for HSC students. While we have trialed a number of ways including school seminars to deliver this program the most efficient and enjoyable way of completing the program has been identified as a camp, of course with the knowledgeable help of the Sport and Recreation team.

Term 4 is also a time of final assessments and Semester 2 reports. Students will all have one more assessment in each of their chosen subjects this term. This may take the form of an in-class test or an out of class assignment or project. Combined with the Term 3 assessments and other formative assessment tasks, this data will form the basis for the final assessment marks on reports. The first reports to be issued will be the final Preliminary reports for Year 11. Having completed their final formal examinations last term, Year 11 have morphed to Year 12 as of Week 2, Term 4, and commenced their HSC courses. It is also pleasing to note the number of Year 12 students who are choosing extension courses.

The 'Mobile Phone Ban' was well publicised as commencing this term. As you know we had a gradual introduction to the ban over the past five weeks of Term 3. Thus, when the ban was introduced this term the students were already used to the process and have seamlessly transitioned

to the new way of being. At Mosman High we have followed the 'Gate to Gate' approach. This means when students enter the school gate they turn off their phone and put it in their bag for the day. On leaving the school gate at the end of the day they take their phone from their bag and check for messages. If students are seen with their phone at any time during the day (including recess or lunch) they have their phone confiscated and placed in the school mobile phone safe. Students can collect their phone at the end of the day from the office. Repeated offences may require a parent to collect the phone or a detention. This term, I am pleased to say there have been no recidivists.

Further exciting news, Mosman High is commencing our overseas excursion program again. 2024 will see a

combined music and language tour to Japan, where we will visit for the first time in three years our sister school Semboku. So, if your student is a musician or learning the Japanese language you are very welcome to contact the school for more information and an expression of interest form.

Finally, I would like to inform our school community that Colette Longley, who has been Deputy Principal at Mosman High School for seventeen years has retired. Recently Colette has been the Deputy Principal responsible for Stage 6 and also responsible for Learning and Support. Colette has been an outstanding member of the executive team and we thank her not only for her contribution to Mosman High School, but her contribution to public education generally.

#### Dear Students, Parents and Staff,

The 2023 HSC exams are upon us with Year 12 students keen to demonstrate their knowledge and reap the benefits of their efforts over the last 12 months. The initial challenge, the completion of the two English papers, was met with determination and focus. It is pleasing to see how our students have settled into the groove, demonstrating their hard work, dedication, and resilience.

Simultaneously, our Year 11 students of 2023 started on their HSC journey for 2024. We have designed an assessment schedule to guide them through this critical period of their academic lives. In most courses, students will undergo four school-based assessments during assessment blocks scheduled for week 8 of each term. - Effective Time Management: Utilise daily planners, schedule breaks, practice exam skills and establish a structured study
- Prioritise Health: Exercise, proper sleep, and balanced nutrition are fundamental to academic success.
- Syllabus Knowledge: Know your subject specific syllabus; seek guidance from your teachers when in doubt.
- Collaborative Learning: Join study groups, connect with peers, and foster a supportive learning environment.
- Teacher Mentorship: Take advantage of the opportunity to work closely with teacher mentors; their guidance can be transformative.
- Utilise Support Services: Access support services such as year advisors, careers advisor and counsellors; your mental wellbeing is paramount.

Furthermore, it is never too early to consider life beyond the HSC. Exploring potential career paths, engaging in work experience, applying early entry programs at universities, and building a network can significantly enrich your prospects. Our careers advisor, Mr. Mew, has a wealth of experience here and can provide guidance for any student who is interested.

At Mosman High we are very fortunate to have a wonderful school with many new and well-resourced classrooms, passionate and caring teachers who welcome students every day into their learning and of course students who are talented in many different areas of the curriculum.

Our students are the fabric of our school and so attendance at school is vital to the sense of belonging, school spirit and success of our school. The words of Hancock et a., 2013 "Every day counts and there is no 'safe' threshold for absences".

At Mosman High we develop and will continue to develop ways to continue to maintain and improve student attendance as our goal is to have students learning at school every day, however, if for some reason students are absent then our aim is to ensure that this is supported by a parent/carer explanation. If your child is absent for any reason, be it a partial absence or full day absence or longer please notify the school of the reason for the absence or reply to the text message that is sent by the school. For longer periods of absence, a medical certificate or documentation will be required. Just a reminder that it is important that you update the school on any changes to addresses or contact details either by phone, email or letter.

Additionally, if your child is going to miss school for an extended time due to a planned holiday or such, please let the school know as soon as possible. Students are required to complete classwork and assessments tasks either before they leave, while on leave or on their return to school. It is important that students discuss any assessment tasks or work that will be missed and find out from their teachers about what they will need to do to catch up on missed work when they return to school.



At Mosman High we understand that there are many factors that influence absenteeism from a lack of self-esteem, learning difficulties and/or a lack of motivation or goals. As parents/ carers and teachers it is our aim to support our students to attend school regularly so if you require help getting your child to school for any reason, please contact us.

We have trained and caring staff that include school counsellors, a well-being nurse, a well-being officer, Year Advisors, Stage Head Teachers, Deputy Principals and Principal who will assist in many practical ways to support you and your child. If you need interpreter assistance to contact the school, please call 131 450, tell the operator what language you need and ask them to phone the school. The operator will get an interpreter on the line to assist you with your conversation. We want to do all we can to be sure your child achieves their potential and enjoys being in school.

We know that school is the best place to learn. By attending school every day your child will get the most out of their learning and improve their career and life options.





We have completed some interesting projects including vertical gardens, game design and coding.




Student use block coding to program the microbits.

## **Merchant Navy Day Memorial Service 2023**

This year, Merchant Navy Day fell on the same day, as Father's Day. This last occurred in 2017. The attendance of 63 guests was most pleasing given that circumstance. This is the second year the Grand Hall at the Mosman Art Gallery has been the venue, which we hope will continue in the future.

We were delighted to have the Mosman High School Captains, Emma Simpson and Raghunath Gokhale, present a tribute to the Merchant Navy. The time and research they had devoted to their excellent address, later created much comment from those present. Consider that this occurred during their study for HSC exams, so we appreciate their considerable efforts and thank Principal Susan Wyatt for making their presence possible.

My thanks also to Capt. Ted van Bronswijk for allowing me to summarise his eulogy to Gordon, published in that newsletter.

Gordon first went to sea as a 14-year-old a couple of years prior to WW11. For the duration of the war, he served on ships operation in Australia, Fiji, India, PNG and NZ. He was in Darwin during the attack by Japanese aircraft. Leaving seagoing service in 1950, he began compiling the names of M. N. seafarers lost during the war and by 1964 had added a large number to the War Service League Roll of Honour, in Melbourne. Then began his membership of the Merchant Navy RSL sub-Branch and Merchant Navv Association, together with the publication of the first edition of "The Red Ensign". In his words "to keep the crowd together". He organised gatherings and lunches, initially at his home, but as they became strongly attended, moved them to the Markets Club at Flemington. All profits from those were donated to the Merchant Navy Memorial at Rookwood. During the 1980's lunches were being held at State Parliament House. In 1990, Gordon became President of both the sub-Branch and Association.

He worked very closely with the Company of Master Mariners, raising funds for the Merchant Navy Memorial in Canberra, which was unveiled in October 1990 by Governor General Bill Hayden. A dinner, attended by 300 was held at The Canberra Club the evening prior. Gordon and his colleagues Bob Nelson and Ron Wylie worked to secure formal recognition of

Merchant Navy veterans war service, in granting and full rep resulting service pensions and full repatriation benefits to those veterans. In 2002, Gordon, Bob and Ron formed a committee to prepare a submission to government for Merchant Navy Day as a "Designated Day" and to be formally recognised. This took six years before success was achieved. Merchant Navy Day was first officially commemorated on 3 September 2009 and has been so in the years following. Even at age 85, Gordon still travelled widely, meeting with veterans to have gatherings at local RSL clubs. With his death in May 2008, his newsletter ceased publication. This was a great

loss, but understandable as it was solely his.

## **Bundanon 2023**

During the October school holidays, 29 Year 9, 10 and 11 Visual Arts students journeyed to **Bundanon**, the home and work site of iconic Australian painter Arthur Boyd, to take part in a rich 3-day Visual Arts program.

Immersed in the striking landscape of the Shoalhaven region and guided by highly knowledgeable Art Educators, students worked 'en plein air' and through direct observation to develop a series of artistic responses to this very special landscape.

Upon arrival, students explored the historic homestead of Arthur Boyd, perusing the impressive collection of ceramics, paintings and sculptures by members of the renowned Boyd family. Students were particularly enthralled by Arthur Boyd's painting studio, in which masses of metal oil paint tubes lay scattered on his desk amongst an array of brushes and other curious contraptions. Enchanted by this intimate insight into the practice of such an acclaimed Artist, students were inspired and ready to create some artworks of their own.

After arriving at the architectural marvel that is 'The Bridge', students commenced an 'Art as Action' artmaking activity informed by Contemporary Australian Artist Janet Lawrence. Exploring the concept of Land Art and environmental intervention as artistic expression, students sketched tube-stocks before planting them on the Bundanon grounds.

After an evening of self-directed artmaking, students woke early for a full day of landscape painting and drawing. Beginning with a morning visit to the Bundanon gallery, students were guided through the current exhibition showcasing the work of Contemporary artists from New Zealand who developed conceptual artworks while in residence at Bundanon. Featuring sound artworks, installations, sculptures and digital artworks, the expansive nature of contemporary art practice challenged students, leading to some very insightful discussion. Afterward, students embraced the challenges of working 'en plein air' (in some very windy conditions) and documented their interpretations of the Shoalhaven river through acrylic painting before changing scenery and working with charcoal to represent a forest environment. Students then engaged in a riveting collaborative reflective dialogue and gallery walk.

Before packing up on the third day, students selected their own materials to create a final artwork of the beautiful Bundanon grounds. Throughout the entire Bundanon experience, students were beaming with creative energy and focus, making them a delight to chaperone.

A huge thank you to Stephen Little who organised this unforgettable experience for our students and to the Mosman High School Art Committee for helping make this happen. We can't wait to return in the future!



## **Library Matters**


